# GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT

Acresge of Corn Flanted is Less Than & Year Ago.

CONDITION IS BEST IN NEBRASKA

Winter and Spring Wheat Are Both Improved-Cats Show Shrinkage-Barley at Its Best-Ryc Excellent-Sweet Pointoes Poor.

WASHINGTON, July 10 .- Preliminary returus to the statisitician of the Department of Agriculture on the acrenge of corn planted indicate a reduction of 400,000 acres, or 5 per cent, from the area planted last year. Of the twenty-two states baying 1,000,000 acres or more of corn in 1900 twelve show, a decrease of 1,300,000 acres.

while in the remaining ten an increase of about 900,000 acres is shown. The average condition of the growing

crop is \$1.3, as compared with \$9.5 on July 1, 1900; \$6.5 at the corresponding date in 1899, and a ten-year average of 90.3. The condition in Nebraska is 88; in Illinois and Iowa, 87; in Kansas, 74; in Missouri, 70, and in Texas, 64. In each of the twenty-two states above referred to, except in Mississippi, Virginia and South Dakota, where the conditions, represented by 58, 92 and 89, respectively, correspond with their ten years' average, their condition is more or less below such average.

Winter Wheat.

The condition of winter wheat improved during June, being \$8.3 on July 1, as compared with \$7.8 on June 1, 80.8 on July 1, 1990, 65.6 at the corresponding date in 1899 and a ten-year average of 80.2. All the important winter wheat states share in this improvement except Pennsylvania, Ohio and Maryland, in which the condition declined during the month 3.2 and 5 points respectively.

# Spring Whent.

The average condition of spring wheat also improved during the month, being 95.6 on July 1, as compared with 92.0 one month ago, 55.2 on July 1, 1900, 91.7 at the corresponding date in 1899 and a ten year average of \$5.6. The condition in Nebraska is 89, Iowa 92, Minnesota 96, South Dakota and North Dakota 100.

The condition of spring and winter wheat combined on July 1 was 91.1, against 69.8 on July 1, 1990, and 76.2 at the corresponding date in 1899.

The amount of wheat remaining in the hands of farmers on July 1 is estimated at about \$1,000,000 bushels, or the equivalent of 5.85 per cent of the crop of 1900
