WHEAT IN SYMPATHY WITH COARSE GRAINS

Provisions Open with a Rush and at Highest Point Reached During the Day-Offerings Scarce.

CHICAGO. July II.—The coarse grains were again active and higher today. September closing 1% gible higher and oats had higher. hefore they are needed for moving the crops.

That some unexpected developments have helped to discourage this new buying and even to induce selling is evident, but the underlying cause of the selling is the Indisposition of the New York banks to foster a speculative movement at this time, in view of the exigencies of the money market which promise to come into force earlier than usual this fail.

The damage undoubtedly done to the crop and the threat of more to come was a potent influence. The action of the corn market itself today induced a feeling in Wall street that the crop situation has been overdiscounted in the week's stex market. The feeling gained ground that technical causes would have to be looked to for an explanation of the force of the selling movement.

This left the way open for many venture-some surmises as to the concealed causes of the notable liquidation going on. One of these was that discord had broken out afresh over the control of the Northern Pacilic. Facts cited to corroborate, this were several. The Northern Pachic directors, it was pointed out, had met and adjourned yesterday without announcing the personality of the new compromise board. Sersational reports were current of a stormy meeting between the two principals in the Northern Pachic contest.

Attention was called to the divergent policy of the banks representing the two contending interests, the one side calling loans freely on Monday, while call loan rates were rising and the other side coming to the relief of the market by lending millions and lowering the rate. The sensational drop in Rock Island caused a conjecture that the protection of recently acquired large holdings in that property had to do with the drastic liquidation in other parts of the list. The liquidation spent its greatest force during the first hour when 50,000 shares were marketed.


