CHICAGO, Ill., July 15.—The grain markets ruled lower today on predictions of more favorable weather, wheat closing \$60, corn iso and oats bac depressed for September delivery. Provisions at the close were flowed lower.

An active demand for wheat at the opening was caused by bullish statistics and a sharp advance at Minneapolis, presumably reflecting unfavorable climatic conditions. The starting price, 600 to 6050 for September, proved the best of the day, however, for Minneapolis lost its initial advance. Showers were predicted and a concerted effort to minimize any damage was made by various interests. SAVE LIVES OF INNOCENTS Conger and Rockhill Discovered to Be Responsible for Preventing Unwarranted Executions.

WASHINGTON, July 15 .- It is now ap parent from mail reports which have reached the State department from China that it was solely through the moderation and humanity exercised by the United States representatives at Pekin by the pres ident's direction in the early negotiations for a settlement of the Boxer trouble that a number of innocent lives were not sacrificed. These reports show that a more soher

and painstaking inquiry has developed the fact that some of the Chinese officials supposed to have been connected with the Boxer outrages, whose capital punishment was demanded by the foreign ministers have been proved to be entirely innocent of the charges against them. In many other cases proof has been adduced that the offenses with which the Chinese officials were charged were not nearly so grave as was supposed at first by the foreign representatives in Pekin. Therefore it is regarded here by officials as a matter for congratulation that Messrs. Conger and Rockhill moved with deliberation and acted as a restraining influence in the matter of punishment, for not only were these lives saved, but under their influence the whole list of capital sentences was reduced from ten to four and militation of other offenses was obtained.

BETTER SERVICE FOR ALASKA


