At the conclusion of the inspection Secretary Root said: "The War department is aware that in Jefferson barracks it has a post that, with little trouble, may be made one of the finest and most efficient in the country. I am not prepared to say what the department will do in the way of improvements, but it expects to utilize the post to its full capacity. The manner of the utilization will be decided upon when I return to Washington. The object of this injunction was to gather data that will enable the department to make this deci-

sion intelligently."

Fix Henry Penalty for

Mob Violence.

RICHMOND, Va., July 15 .- The constitutional convention of Virginia was in session but twenty-one minutes today. most important resolution introduced was that offered by Mr. Pedigo (republican) of Henry county, which aims to prevent lynch-ing. It provides that the governor shall offer a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of every person who shall engage in the offense; that the crime shall be murder in the first degree where the hanging or lynching is accomplished and that it shall be the duty of the governor to pay \$1,000 to the heirs of any person lynched, the money to come out of the state treasury and be chargeable to the county or city

in which the crime was committed.
