CITY MISSION MUST CO

House Dedicated to Christianity About to Be Seld fer Immeral Purposes.

NEGOTIATIONS ARE NOW PENDING

Indications Point to Consummation of

Sale and the Secessity of the Mis-

sion Removing from Home

Guaranteed to It by Bequest. The old Omaha city mission property, located on Tenth street between Dodge street and Capitol avenue, which for over twentyfive years has been used for mission and Christian purposes, is now the subject of negotiations, which, it is said, are likely to devote it to purposes in violent contrast to

those which it has served for a quarter of a century.

The ground upon which it is located belongs to the estate of the late G. C. Monell, of which G. M. Hitchcock and John J. Monell are administrators. Twenty-five years ago, when the old Omaha mission was organized, G. C. Monell was one of its active workers and promoters, and as an encouragement to its work he donated the use of the ground upon which this structure has ever since stood. It was understood then, and has always since been understood by the mission workers of the city, that it was his inten-

five years since the organization of the mission it has always been devoted to mission purposes and charity work and before the organization of the Associated Charities nearly all charitable effort fell upon those whose interests clustered around this old

building. During recent years many of the old residents of the city who had organized and carried on the work of the old mission society have died or gone to other homes, and the work of the mission languished. until last fall the building was turned over to the Women's Christian Temperance union, which has continued the mission

school there. The authorities of the mission understood in the days of Mr. Monell that they were to have the use of the ground rent free upon condition that they would take care of the taxes, and they have accordingly secured the remission of all city and

county taxes upon the property. Some time ago the mission authorities were informed that the property was likely to be sold and were asked to prepare to yield possession. Messrs. Hitchcock and Monell, administrators of the Monell estate, had figured against the mission a bill for rent aggregating something like \$1,100 or \$1,200 at the rate of \$10 a month, but later concluded that they would call it square if the mission would relinquish to hem the old house. In order that the sale of the property might be carried out it was necessary that they secure from the mission an agreement to vacate March 1 next. This agreement has been furnished to the administrators in writing. It was mailed to

Anna Wilson Negotiates. No definite information has been given n by the administrators as to the identity of the proposed purchaser of the property, but it is reported that a few days ago Anna Wilson, owner and operator of one or more houses of ill-repute in the tenderloin district, visited the place, looked over the building and informed Miss Magee, who is in charge at the mission school, that she had either bought the property or expected to buy it. Miss Wilson denies that she has bought the property, but says that she did look it over with a view of buying it. She says that

she did buy a piece of property just across the street from the mission school.
