Chency has regained consciousness to some extent and seems to wish to convey the impression that he attempted suicide, but cutting off an arm is not generally accepted as being the most approved method of self-destruction. Chency lived alone with a half-witted son, and many believe that it was he who attempted his father's life. The injured man had lost so much blood when discovered by a neighbor that life was nearly extinct and, although he has railled at intervals, the doctor has but little hope for his recovery.


