

STATE SHUTS OUT RELATIVES

Does Not Intend to Harbor Families in Public Buildings.

CUSTER COUNTY TEACHERS BREAK RECORD

Valuation of Surplus Products Shipped by Rail—Dr. Somers of Omaha Made Secretary of State Board of Health.

LINCOLN, Aug. 1.—(Special.)—The State Board of Public Lands and Buildings today inaugurated a revolution in the management of state institutions by adopting the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Lands and Buildings shall on and after September 1, 1901, the family of no officer of any state institution, except the superintendent of any state institution, be permitted to reside within such institution.

The action was taken on recommendation of Governor Savage, but his colleagues agreed that the suggestion was a good one and the vote on it was unanimous.

The adoption of the resolution means that a superintendent and his family and the actual employes may live in the institution entrusted to their care, but the privilege will not extend to friends and relatives of any employe.

Teachers Swarm in Custer County. Information was received at the office of the state superintendent of public instruction today that there were 277 teachers attending the annual institute in Custer county.

An interesting as well as exciting spelling contest is in progress at the Custer County Teachers institute. On the first sitting of 200 selected words six teachers were marked perfect and yesterday afternoon three of the number met for the final contest.

Births Must Be Registered. The city authorities have revived the old law requiring that all births be registered. A strict record will be kept and parents neglecting to notify the authorities of the birth of a child may be fined any amount between \$10 and \$100.

Issue Over Love Affairs. Hannah Swan was today removed from the poor farm, where she has been kept several months, and will be confined in the asylum. She is 25 years of age and imagines that she is the victim of an unfortunate love affair. The cause of her ailment is unknown.

More in Spite of Handicap. During the past month Revenue Collector E. B. Stephenson has collected \$361,619.32, or more than has been received in any month during the past five years.

Surplus Products Shipped. Deputy Labor Commissioner Watson has completed a compilation showing the valuation of surplus products shipped by railroads from the various states in Nebraska during the year 1900.

Dr. Somers is Secretary. The State Board of Health today made the following appointments: Dr. A. B. Somers of Omaha to succeed Dr. O. G. Grothman of St. Paul, as secretary of the Board of Health, term of four years; Dr. D. A. Messo of Auburn, to succeed Dr. W. McHenry of Nelson, for term of one year, and Dr. W. N. Doreward of Omaha, to succeed Dr. H. C. Whitney of Omaha, for term of three years, as secretaries of the State Dental Board.

Dr. Somers is Secretary. This afternoon Mrs. Emma Johnson of Lincoln was appointed auxiliary secretary for the State Board of Charities and Corrections.

Farmers' and Merchants' Bank. Articles of incorporation of the Farmers' and Merchants' State bank of this city were filed in the secretary of state's office today.

Deputy Game Wardens. Governor Savage today appointed the following deputy game wardens to serve without compensation: E. B. Harman of Fullerton; for Nance county; John H. Burk of Elgin, for Antelope county; W. G. Craig of Falls City, for Richardson county; John Kartens of Crete, for Saline county.

Addition to Horticultural Hall. At a meeting of the Board of Public Lands and Buildings this morning a contract for building an addition to the Horticultural hall on the state fair grounds was awarded to O. H. Brod of this city, the cost being limited to \$251.50.

Edna Sharp Removed. The superintendent of the Home for the Friendless has been authorized to remove Edna Sharp, an inmate, to the Industrial School for Girls at Geneva. The girl was sent to the home several years ago by an orphan founding association of New York state.
