DANNY HALEY IS SOON DONE

Omaha Man Lasts Less Than Eight Minutes in the Ring.

MIKE SHRECK OF CINCINNATI BESTS HIM

Boysen and Krensaw Put Up a Good Preliminary for a Draw Decision—Challenges Fly Thick and Fast.

Handicapped by inexperience and a lack of speedy movement, Danny Haley of Omaha lasted just seven minutes and forty seconds before the terrific punches of Mike Shreck, a Cincinnati fighter, at the Red Light theater, South Omaha. Haley was taller, rangier, had a longer reach and looked to weigh easily twelve pounds more than his antagonist, but all this counted as naught against the superb ring generalship, all-around shiftness and vicious hitting of his opponent. Four times did the local man go to the mat, always taking his full nine seconds, and the last blow, one to his jaw at the middle of the third round, was too much for his exhausted powers, and he was unable to get up in time. The men fought at catch weights.

Haley was clearly outclassed from the start. The first round was a mere feeler on Shreck's part, he devoting himself to measuring his man. In the second Mike mixed things and did some work. The local boy simply never seemed to work. The fight was rather tame in an uncertain manner and seemed puzzled because none of his swings landed. Then Shreck put him down with a straight arm jaw blow which sent Haley sprawling. The round ended as soon as Haley got up a stomach jab put him back on his feet, but the round found the ring, clinching whenever he could get near enough. The result was then clearly a matter of time only, with chances for a speedy finish.

It came after a minute and forty seconds of the third round. Shreck put his opponent down half way under the south side ropes with a smash on the jaw, and reeled back to the center of the ring, and as soon as Haley was on his feet, Shreck whirled and fell on his face under the ropes on the west side of the ring. He was conscious, but unable to rise.

It was an unequal match. Shreck landed whenever and wherever he pleased. Haley was thrown through and through, but had no idea of how to handle himself against the brown-skinned whirlwind. Savage stomach punches weakened him greatly and jaw blows made an easy finale. He bled from the nose during the second and third rounds. As soon as Haley was counted out Shreck himself picked up his prone antagonist and set him on his feet. Then he laid one hand on top of a ring post and vaulted lightly clear over the top rope upon to the high stage behind the ring, fresh and strong and without a mark on his face.

Challenged by a few thick and fast before the fight, Frank Collier of Brooklyn challenged Shreck by a telegram which was read, and he was accepted. "Kid" Dawson of Syracuse, N. Y., was introduced into the ring and won high favor. He challenged the winner, and Haley accepted, win or lose. Oscar Gardner challenged Johnnie Richie for a return fight at any weight over 114 pounds, and Richie accepted at 122 pounds, offering through his manager a side bet of \$1,000. This match was definitely arranged at once and will be fought soon.

Enthusiasm Runs High. A good sized crowd attended the fight and wild enthusiasm reigned from the start. Some money was bet at the ringside event. The spectators seemed to have been put in high little by the preliminary bout, which was as fierce amateur work as was ever seen in South Omaha. Christ Boysen and Charles Krensaw were the principals of this match and it was for only three rounds. Both are Omaha boys, weighing 125 pounds, and they went into it as if they had no time enough.
