"There are over 250 plates in our exhibit and it is no small task to keep these constantly full of fresh, rips fruit. We have no difficulty, however, in finding first-class apples and plums and peaches that would surprise most of the people who live here in Nebraska. Most of the plums come from Douglas county, but we get good apples from all of the countles I have mentioned."

Ansley, formerly of the teaching staff of the State university, but now of Iowa university. Mr Ansley asks for a mandamus to compel the payment to him of salary for the last quarter he served. pay for his vacant quarter. The regents present four defenses to the action. They say that there was no appropriation for the payment of this sum, that there is no fund out of which they can pay it and that anyway the appropriation for the blennium 1899 and 1900 has been exhausted. They say that on December 15, 1898, the regents adopted an amended by-law governing the payment of salaries to professors and other members of the teaching staff. 
