The arrangement of the interiors of these dwellings is highly ingenious, the necessities of the case requiring the utmost economy of space, the average sleeping car suggesting a model. Half a dozen persons have been at night accommodated with logging in one of them. Ventilation is always assured.

While there are many families permanent residents of "Cartown," the larger number occupy the "vehicles" as others do the houseboat, giving opportunities for original methods of entertainment and diversion for themselves and friends. Confined and restricted as these dwellings are, there is compensation in the fresh ocean breezes which here blow right from the sea, testides the enjoyment of a health-giving environment.



HUNT FOR A LOST MINE.

Perilous Trip Undertaken by Two

Prospectors in Montana. I. S. Corson of Sunnyside and George Chichester of Great Falis, Mont., have just left the latter place on a hunt that has baffled hundreds of men in the last quarter of a century. Not only is the trip a perilous one, but it gives no more prombe of success than the previous futile attempts The object of their search is a lost placer mine, and the mode of reaching it in this instance is a small, open rownoat in the treacherous Missouri river. The story goes that in the early '60s the partner of the that in the early see the partner of the late John Lepley, who had been down between Fort Benton, discovered a rich placer claim and took several thousands of dollars out of it. The prospector wrote to Lepley to make the trip with him on one occasion, but as the latter did not reply to his letter ha took with him instead a squaw and two white men.

took with him instead a squaw and two white men.

The party went down the river from Fort Benton in a small boat and campel one night on the banks of the stream. The country abounded in hostile Indians who discovered the party and killed all but the squaw, who hid in the brush.

The place where the killing was fone is now known as Dead Man rapids and is a few miles above the Mussellahell, now covered by the ranch of W. M. McGinnis. The squaw made her way back to the fort and now lives on the Fort Belknap reservation. She was unable to give any definite location of the mine, but said that the locator tood her that the spot where they camped was within "one sleep" of the end of the journey, but he did not say whether by land or water.

Hundreds of searching parties have andeavored to locate the mine since that time, but none of them has been successful. Tho a who are acquainted with the geography of the country believe that it is in the Bad Lands at the mouth of the Mussellahel, but the ground is of so rough a character that it would take a man's lifetime to prospect a spot ten miles square.

Chichester and Corson are well supplied with provisions and prospecting suffits and profess to believe they will discover the lost mine. It is intimated that they have an inside tip. At any rate the outcome of their search is awaited with much interest.


