BRINGS BODY OF MRS. ROSS

Steamer Hating Bears Victim of the Islander Disaster.

INDIANS ROB CORPSES WASHED ASHORE

United States Marshal Sends Deputies, Who Apprehend the Ghouls—Death List Revised to Include Forty Names.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 23.—The steamer Hating arrived in port today bringing the bodies of five victims of the Islander disaster. In all, nineteen bodies have been recovered and it is authentically stated that the total number of lives lost was forty. The bodies brought here today were those of Mrs. Ross, wife of Governor Ross of the Yukon territory, and her infant child; Mrs. Ross of San Francisco, Director Joseph Dunningan of Victoria, and Captain H. THEY RECEIVE VICUNA'S BODY

Officials and Diplomats at Washington Escort It to Its Temporary Tomb.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The body of Senator Morla Vicuna, late minister of Chili to the United States, arrived in Washington today from Buffalo. The funeral cortege was met at the depot by a number of officials and members of the diplomatic corps, including Colonel W. H. Michael, in behalf of the State department; W. C. Fox, acting chief of the Bureau of American Republics, the Peruvian minister, Mr. Calderon, the Costa Rican minister, Mr. Calvo; representatives from the Mexican, Japanese, Venezuelan, Dominican and other legations. The funeral party proceeded to Rock Creek cemetery, where the casket was deposited in the receiving vault, pending a determination on the final disposition of the body. Over the casket were draped the Chilean and American flags, while a procession of beautiful floral offerings were arranged about it. There were no services at the cemetery. It will be decided later whether the body will be sent to Chili on board the Chilean war ship which will soon arrive or will go via San Francisco. The Bureau of American Republics was closed today. At the Chilean legation many officials and members of the diplomatic corps called during the day to leave cards of respect and condolence.

WISH LI HUNG CHASTISED

Chinese Officials Petition Emperor to Have Him Punished.

NATIVE EDITORS ALL DENOUNCE HIS WORK

Call It Betrayal of His Country and Otherwise Seek to Add to Unpleasantness of His Retirement.

PEKIN, Aug. 23.—The delay of the Chinese plenipotentiaries in signing the protocol is causing some uneasiness in the foreign community here, although the ministers of the powers do not think the Chinese intend to defy the powers by ultimately refusing to sign. They believe China is anxious to wind up the negotiations speedily.
Decreases rectifying the punishments and suspending the examinations will be issued before the Chinese signatures are affixed.
Prince Ching, at the request of the emperor, telegraphed to her verbatim the restrictions as to the importation of arms.
Li Hung Chang, having practically conducted all the active negotiations, has retired into the background, leaving to Prince Ching the responsibility of consummating the work. Earl Li finds himself in the same precarious position that he occupied at the close of the negotiations following the war with Japan. The native press is unanimous in violently denouncing him for what is called his surrender to the foreigners, and a number of officials have petitioned the emperor to punish him for betraying his country.
LONDON, Aug. 24.—Immense quantities of arms and ammunition are being manufactured in the arsenals of China," says the Pekin correspondent of the Times, "and immense quantities are also being imported, mainly by way of Yang Tee Kiang."

PHILIPPINE FOREIGN TRADE

Both Imports and Exports Show a Large Increase Over the Previous Year.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—A continued increase in both the import and export trade of the Philippines is shown in a comparative statement compiled at the War department giving the commerce of the islands for the seven months ending January 31, 1901 and 1900. The total value of merchandise imported during the seven months ended January 31, 1901, was \$17,991,167, as against \$12,674,709 for the same period in 1900, and the merchandise exported was \$12,637,352, as against \$8,330,000 for the 1900 period. This shows an increase of 42 per cent in the value of imports and 52 per cent in export values.

UNCLE SAM JUST LOOKS ON

Venezuelan-Columbian Trouble Concerns Him Only to the Extent of Safety for Citizens' Interests.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The progress of the complications between Venezuela and Colombia continues to attract the attention of the authorities here, who occupy the position of disinterested observers of an affair in which the United States has no direct concern, except in properly safeguarding American interests. The event of an actual conflict between Venezuela and Colombia there is felt to be no occasion for action on the part of this government, except in pursuing the usual course of looking after the property interest of our citizens in that quarter. The State department has no official advice from either country.

HOWISON INCIDENT CLOSED

Captain Lemly Returns and Begins Compiling List of Witnesses to Be Called.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—At the Navy department the matter of the retention of Admiral Howison on the Schley inquiry is considered a closed incident so far as the department is concerned, and one which will be left to the consideration of the court itself.
Mr. Hackett stated today that he had not received the reply, which, it is said, Admiral Schley will submit in regard to the action of the department declining to refer the original request concerning the Howison interview to that officer for a statement.
Captain Lemly, the judge advocate general of the navy and the judge advocate of the Schley court, has returned from Canada and will at once begin the work of compiling a list of the witnesses to be summoned before the court of inquiry. It is expected that this list will be ready for submission to Admiral Schley next week.
Captain Lemly will give practically all his attention to the Schley case from this time on, leaving the details of the judge advocate's office to those who have handled them in his absence.

COLOMBIA QUILTS PAYING

Instructs Governors to Take Whatever is Needed Hereafter.

SAYS PRESENT CASE IS ONE OF NECESSITY

Not Only Suspends Payment for War Materials and Council's Contribution, but Instructs Governors to Force Contributions.

COLON, Aug. 23.—(Via Galveston.)—An official decree dated Bogota, July 18, and addressed to the governors of the departments was published today. It says: "A new aspect of the war which seems to kindle anew with the help of foreigners who threaten the frontier, places the government under the necessity of assuming a different attitude from that maintained hitherto and forces it to proceedings which it has previously tried to avoid."
"It has been resolved firstly, to suspend the payment of all accounts for material pending, and to limit the expenses to the payment of the armed force and administration."
"Secondly, to proceed to appropriate all the necessary elements for the feeding, equipment and the mobilization of the army."
"Thirdly, to levy forced and voluntary loans, according to circumstances, and to impose war contributions in order to meet the expenses of each department without depending on the national capital."
"The governors are hereby authorized to proceed in these matters according to the requirements of the cases, without the need of approval from the government and each governor must assume the responsibility in order to save the situation within his territory."
