CREWS RESCUED BY LIFE SAVING SERVICE

Navigators' Guiding Marks so Hidden by Denne Smoke from Forest Fires that Winds Blow Bonts at Random.

FORT HURON, Mich., Sept. 8 .- After one of the roughest nights ever known on Lake Huron, made werse by a heavy pall of amoke that everhing the water, six vessels are wrecked on the beach, three miles north of here. The crews of four of them were rescued by the life-saving crew during the night, thirty-eight persons all told, and the crews of the other two are still on their vessels, but in no danger. Several other craft were in grave danger during the night. but were extricated this morning. wrecked craft are the Wawatam and conacrt. Whaleback 102, Pauley and consort Amaranth, barge Paige and tug Sarnia. In the smoke and gale their masters lost their bearings and went wshore, thinking they

were headed for the harbor. As though the gale which blew last night were not enough, great clouds of smoke from the forest fires north of here obscured every buoy and light from view. The lake was lashed into giant waves by the wind. The Wawatam and consort were the first to go ashore and it is thought that both will be almost total losses, as they are so high on the beach that it is impossible to reach them with working outfits. Their crews remained abourd. The lifesaving crew from here took their apparatus to the accue when the wrecks were reported, and they were soon needed for the crews of the other vessels, which went ashere in more dangerous places and were in danger of breaking up. Trip after trip was made to the various craft until all th sailors were safe ashore. The Amaranth broke in two during the night and the tug Sarnia is going to pieces. The barge Paige is also in bad shape. The Canadian steamer Rosemont and barges Winnipeg and Selkirk had parrow escapes.

The sea is still heavy and it is impossible to estimate what the loss will be.

Life Crews Save Many.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 .- Dispatches received by the life saving service today indicate that a very serious storm raged pesterday and last night on Lake Huron. Thes. dispatches report a number of disasters to lake craft and show that, all told, fifty-six

All on board were saved by the life saving crew. The same dispatch tells of the rescue of crew of five from the schooner Vienna o Beamansville, Canada, which was stranded at 4 o'clock this morning a mile from Harbor Beach life saving station.
