The body of the late premient will be in state in the rotunda for the remainder of Tuesday and will be escorted to the railroad station Tuesday evening. The functal train will leave Weshington at or about so clock Tuesday evening and will arrive at Canton during evening and will arrive at Canton during evenings.

Sept. 16.—The remains of the late president, after lying in state in the city half of Buffale during the afternoon of Banday. September 16, will be removed to Washington by special train on Monday. Beptember 16, reaving Suffale at 8.55 a. m. and reaching Washington at 9 p. m. The remains win then be carried, under the escort of a squadron of United States cavalry to the executive mansion, where they will rest until 9 a. m. Tuesday, September 17. They will then be carried to the capitol, accompanied by a military and civil escort, the details of which will be given in a separate mater.

The remains will there he in state. Religious services will be held in the rotunda of the capitol on Wednesday at 12 o clock noon. At 1 o clock the remains, under a military escort, will be transferred to a funeral car and carried to Canton, O., that the Fennsylvania ratiroad, arriving there on Thursday at 11 a. m., where arrangements for the final sepulture will be committed to the charge of the citizens of Canton under the direction of a committee to be selected by the mayor of that city. No ceremonies are expected in the cities and towns along the route of the funeral train beyond the tolling of belis.

General Randolph arranged with Ser geant-at-Arms Ransdell that they should co-operate in the management of the funeral ceremonies at the capitol. Four private soldiers will stand watch day and night, one at each corner of the catafalque. so long as the remains of the late presiden shall lie in the capitol building. A suitable guard will be maintained at the entrapes and will keep the people in alignment whe they are admitted to the capitol to view the remains next Tuesday.

Acting Secretary Hackett ordered that detail should be made up consisting of two officers, four petty officers and twenty-one privates in the marine corps for duty at the capitol next Tuerday to supplement the army representation. The special guard of honor to represen
