FEDERAL BUILDING PLANS

Work on the Unfinished Annex Will Be Pushed Rapidly.

INSTRUCTIONS COME FROM WASHINGTON

oustruction Superintendent Mardock is Now in Possession of Complete Details for Bringing the Gov-

ernment Stepeture to Date.

New plans for the completion of the federal building which have been awaited so long reached Superintendent of Construction Murdock yesterday morning from Washington. Work will now be pushed with all speed, fourteen months hence being the

latest date of completion allowed. As has been planned, the new specificaions provide for the filling in of the Seventeenth street front between the two wings with a construction the full height of the building and very similar to the Sixteenth street frontage. The first plans would have made this section but one story high. Senator Millard was responsible for the alteration, and to him is also due credit for the rushing of the new specifications.

Probably the chief feature of the new secion will be the vast rallway mail platform, extending ninety feet along the new frontage. This will be nine feet in depth and will be covered with a stone porch, the platform in its entirety reflecting the architecture of the entrance porch on the Sixteenth street side. Above this porch is to be an arcade of

eight circular headed windows, extending up through the second and third stories. The whole will be topped with a fourth story and similar to that at the front entrance, there being three steep-sided dormer windows, with slate roof rising away to the rear.

This new section will extend back toto the court thirty feet and the inside wall facing the court will be finished like the one opposite it, the rear wall of the Sixteenth street front. That means double rows of six cirrular topped windows to the fourth story. where the steep roof begins. Nine new rooms is the total extra accommodation given by the new four-story portion and this will provide 5,000 square feet of floor space. A feature of the plans is that all corridors above the first or ground floor will now be run clear around the building.

Just now there are eighteen men working on the postoffice building. That comprises one small gang that has been kept busy doing what could be safely done while plans were awaited. In a short time there will be three or four times as many here.

But that is not all. Out in Denver are eighty men who have never stopped hewing and trimming the stone for the edifice, and in Indianapolis sixty more are constantly employed on the iron work for this building alone. These men have never ceased work despite the delay here. So the force actually employed on the ground represents only a small portion of the total number of workngmen helping on this job. Only one thing now stands in the way to cause any delay. That is the contract for the new task. The C. W. Gindele company

of Chicago, which has done the rest of the work, will be asked for figures at once and it will not take more than ten days for the financial end to be settled. Then everything will swing at once toward completion. Competitive bidding cannot well be allowed in this job because of the fact that there have been so many changes in plans, necessitating allowances for work
