That was owing to the fact that packers had to have the cattle and as a result they paid good prices in order to get them. Practically everything in the yards was disposed of in good season. Although the bulk of the offerings con-sisted of butcher stock the cow market was active and higher. The better grades were easily strong to a dime higher. The medium grades and canners did not show much change, but still they moved more freely than they have for the last several days. 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


