Again, any suspicion of such an intention on the part of the Pennsylvania is made to look natural and most probable by the fact that the Vanderbilt influences have now secured control of a through line with the addition of the Northwestern and the Union Pacific, and the Pennsylvania would supposedly strive to do the same.

Just what this means cannot be learned in Omaha. It is known that the Moores are potent factors in the Diamond match combine and in the Tinpiste trust, but that they now possess a speaking influence in the Fennsylvania railroad is doubted, as that system is said to be owned largely in Philadelphia. That the strength of the Moores in Rock Island matters is now becoming supreme, however, cannot be doubted, when it is seen with what ease

REDELL HEARING GOES OVER Board Decides to Purchase One Nev Steamer, Four Hose Wagons

It is likely that the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners will not hear the charges preferred against John Redell, sus-

pended chief of the fire department, for at least thirty days. At a brief meeting of the board held yesterday for the purposes of hearing the Re-dell charges City Attorney Connell advised hat no action be taken until forty days have elapsed since the recent decision of the supreme court. This recommendation was made at the request of Redell's attorneys. Although the members of the board did not agree to allow the hearing to be delayed, they adjourned without setting a

date for the trial, and with the tacit understanding that City Attorney Connell's suggestion will be acted upon. The board instructed the secretary to open correspondence with manufacturers of fire-fighting apparatus and to secure prices on hose wagons, hose and fire engines. At the suggestion of Mayor Moores the members of the board decided to purchase four new hose wagons and a new fire engine. Two of the new hose wagons will be with of the latest improved pattern and will cost about \$1,000 each. The carts now in use will be sent to the outlying firehouses and the improved wagons will be kept in the central portion of the city. It is likely that the new engine will be placed in No. 2 fire-

house, as the engine at that house is in bad condition. A short time ago 3,000 feet of new hose was purchased. The board members agreed that at least 7,000 additional feet of new hose must be purchased as soon as next year's funds are available. It is probable that at least two new firehouses will be established next year.

In discussing the need of additional fire stations Mayor Moores said: "The wholesale district of the city must have a wellequipped firehouse. I think the corner of Tenth and Jackson streets would be a good location. The property interests in that portion of the city are so great and are of so much importance to the prosperity of the city that they cannot be allowed to go unprotected any longer. Then there should be a firehouse somewhere west of the new High school building. Such a house would afford protection to the new school building and would accommodate a large residence district which has inadequate protection at present."
