The speculation was almost entirely professional and was re-pressed in its nature, with a disposition to caution about encroaching on the limited money supplies. Amalgamated Copper market and its increasant fluctuations had some sympathetic effect always, but the effect was more marked on the upward range of prices, and the gains established by the general market were yielded stub-pornly when Amalgamated Copper reacted. That stock touched 60% soon after the opening, a decline from yesterday's closen ing and reported weak, and shares of cop-per companies everywhere were depressed.
