NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The preliminary figures of the weekly cash movement furnished by the banks themselves gave assurance that the return flow of currency from the channels of domestic trade has set in force. There was a quick response in the money market, where enormous offerings of funds carried the rate down to 6 per cent. Standing loans were all readily marked down to that rate on request of the borrowers. There was a palpable shifting of speculative accounts from Reading to United States Steel, and there were similar advances in other parts of the market, Transactions in United States Steels were on a large scale and those stocks held their advantage more firmly than the general market.

There was strength in a number of central traffic and western railroads. Wabashes were conspicuous. Toledo, St. Louis & Western stocks were unusually active on rumors of absorption by the Vanderblit interests. On the other hand, all the recently speculative favorites were under acute pressure. These included the coalers, especially Reading, grangers and Pacifics. An ostentatious advance of 3½ in Great Northern preferred and bidding up of Northern Securities company on nominal transactions in the outside market failed to deter speculators from selling the Pacifics. The easing of the money rate was accompanied by higher rates for foreign exchange and the simultaneous relapse of sterling exchange in Paris narrows the margin toward the point of profit in gold exports.
