## MORE CONSOLIDATION TALK

Committee of Fifteen Meets and Dis. cusses Plan Submitted by Sub-Committee.

The committee of fifteen appointed to prepare a plan for the consolidation of the municipalities of the eastern part of Douglas county met at the Commercial club rooms yesterday afternoon to consider the report of the subcommittee of five, which was published in The Bee of January 1.

John L. Webster acted as spokesman for the subcommittee, going over the report and explaining in detail the ideas of the members upon the matters presented. There was considerable discussion as to ways and means, but nothing in the way of a modification of the report was presented.

W. G. Whitmore, representing the country voters, said that he did not believe these voters would be friendly to any plan of segregation, as they seem to think that their separation from the county would increase the expense of the county government, or rather that part of it paid by the property owners outside of the city of Omaha.

It was the opinion of the members of the committee that while the constitution of the state provided for the submission of a proposition to divide a county to the voters of the entire county, in this case the affirmative vote of every part of the county affected should be secured before the plan should become effective.

The committee finally adopted the following resolution:

Resolved. That the report of the sub-committe be received and adopted as a tentative outline plan of consolidation, sub-ject to such changes as may be found de-sirable.

Omaha Association of Credit Men Asks

Congress to Make Some

Amendments.

The Omaha Association of Credit Men, of which C. N. Robinson is president, has drafted a set of resolutions pertaining to the national bankrupt law, which will be sent to all members of congress and will be tional Association of Credit Men. The resolutions declare that a national bankrupt law is necessary, but point out defects in the present law and ask for their correction

Seven changes in the law are suggested by the Omaha credit men. It is urged that the law be so changed that it shall state in upmistakable language that all payments made in good faith and in the ordinary course of trade shall not be considered preferences. It is suggested that the United States courts be granted exclusive jurisdiction in all cases pertaining to bankruptcy. It is urged that discharge be denied bankrupts who give false reports, have obtained property on credit secured by false representation, have been granted a discharge in bankruptcy within six years, have become insolvent through gambling or dissipation, whose estates have not paid at least 25 per cent to creditors or who have failed to attend at least one meeting of creditors. A demand is made for uniform

exemptions under the law. It is asked that a bankrupt's wife be required to testify. that persons shall be required to attend bankruptcy hearings, regardless of where they live, and that the bankrupt be compelled to meet his creditors at least once without expense to his estate.
