Corn started firm and higher with wheat and on fairly good cables. Some of the corn sold yestprday was replaced and there was some small country buying. Cash houses reported 5c decline for car corn m as many days. Good weather curtailed the amount needed for stock feeding and the absence of demand worked against the pit. Liquidation on all sides set in about the noon hour and prices slumped in a panicky fashion. May, which had opened steady, at 654,0654c and sold up to 65%c, dropped almost 2c to 65%c. At this figure shorts took profits enough to steady the market at the close. The session ended with May weak, 1%c down, at 65%c. Receipts were 83 cars.

Early in the day oats ruled rather firm and independent of the other grains. Prices opened higher in spite of the more liberal country offerings, selling as high as 46%c. Finally under the corn influence oats began to tumble. Large quantities of long stuff were thrown out. The provisions people, who were already short large quantities, began selling more. A leading professional unloaded considerable, but there was a firm stand by the bulls to support the market and this tended to steady the tone. May sold off to 44%c and closed weak, %c down at 44%c. Receipts were 120 cars.

Provisions were fairly active. They started out with good evidence of a bull market on a country demand and a strong hog market at the yards. When corn collapsed the early bought stuff was thrown overboard and prices slid off. May pork closed to down at \$17.07%, May lard 7%c lower at 18.70 and May ribs 7½c lower at 18.90 and 190 cars; oats, 150 cars; hogs, 40,000 head.

PERU, Ind., Jan. 15 .- As the result of a strange hallucination, J. E. Sible, an old and trusted engineer of the Wabash railroad, was fatally injured last night. Sible was at the throttle of the big locomolive of the limited, which was going at a rate of forty miles an hour. When the lights of the town of Attica appeared the old engineer gave a start and shouted to Burt Frick, his fireman: "Jump for your life, Burt, the switch is turned, we'll crash

The sentence was not finished; for in an instant Sible had applied the safety brake, reversed the lever and had jumped to escape the specter his harassed nerves had conjured up. The fireman followed, but was not injured. The train came to a stop and Frick went back to find his engineer. The latter lay on the roadbed, fatally injured. His skull had been crushed. an arm and leg broken, his ribs fractured and his spine injured. He was carried aboard the train. Meanwhile an investi-gation showed that there had been no danger to the train. The signal lights of the switch showed an unobstructed path. Sible was brought to a hospital here, where he

managed to gasp out his story.

According to Fireman Frick, Sible has been more or less nervous ever since he was in a wreck at Lafayette some months ago. The passengers were shaken up by the sudden stopping of the train, but none of them was injured.
