RULES FOR RURAL CARRIERS

Postoffice Department Places Country Postmen on the Civil Service List.

On and after February 1 the rural free delivery carriers of the United States will be under the rules of the civil service commissioner and each applicant for a position will be required to stand an examination to show his proficiency in the handling of mail and in the transaction of such registry and money order business as may come within

his line of duty. Instructions covering the new plan have been issued to agents and a meeting was held at Denver this week at which all of the special agents in the division were present to consider the application of the new rules. The general opinion expressed at the meeting was that these rules will tend to improve the service, and that as they are not difficult they will be acceptable to the communities where the routes are established.

Under the new system no blank application will be issued to a person desiring to secure employment in the service until the special agent arrives to conduct the examination. The postmaster at the initial point on the route will be requested to submit the names of at least three persons for the position. When the special agent arrives he will give to each person a blank application, which must be filled out in his presence. The applicant will then be required to read twenty-five addresses written upon cards and will then fill out a recelpt for registered matter and another for money to be sent by money order. The age limit is between the years of 17

and 55, except in the case of veterans of the civil war or Spanish war, when, if the applicants are physically capable, the age limit will not apply. Under the general civil service rules preference will be given to such veterans in all cases. Each carrier will be required to provide a substitute, who must be qualified as well as himself and give bond in the same amount, \$500.
