Real Estate Taxes Show Increase Over Corresponding Month of

Last Year.

City Treasurer Hennings has issued a statement showing the taxes collected in June, 1903, compared with June, 1902. The percentage of the real estate taxes levied which was collected increased from 64 per cent in 1902 to 70 per cent in 1903, though the amount, owing to the smaller levy, was considerably less.
