Thrashing Returns Show What is Not Turned Out Well.

CORN IN MOST SECTIONS CONTINUES LATE

Making Good Progress in Some States, but to South of Nebraska is Beginning to Suffer for Rain.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The weather bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions is as follows:

While the temperature in the central and western regions and the coast districts was averaged considerably below normal, no unfavorable effects from cool weather have been reported.

The need of rain is beginning to be felt in Oklahoma and Kansas. Local rain accompanied by hail drove the water in the upper Mississippi and Ohio valleys and light region.

Corn has made favorable advancement in all districts, but in the principal states has variable as to size and condition, being generally small, especially in the central and western districts of the belt.

Sheep and lambs were another big run of sheep and lambs here today, which makes the supply for the two days far in excess of any previous two days this year.

Quotations for grass stock: Good to choice yearling steers, \$10.00; good to choice yearling heifers, \$9.00.

NEBRASKA CROP CONDITIONS. Past Week Cool, with Numerous Storms Which Have Done Much Damage.

The past week has been cool, with numerous heavy rain, wind, or hailstorms, injuring crops considerably in small areas.

The mean daily temperature has averaged two degrees below normal in eastern counties and four degrees below in the western.

In the extreme southeastern counties the rainfall was less than half an inch; elsewhere it quite generally exceeded one inch and in some cases exceeded five inches.

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
