

Hostile Squadron Withdraws Ready


to Break Through National

Defenses.

BAR HARBOR Me., Aug. 3 .- The naval naneuvers actually began today, when the so-called offensive squadron withdraw from the combined North Atlantic fleet and departed from the harbor.

The squadron was in command of Rear Admiral Sands and consisted of the battlephips Texas, Indiana and Massachusetts and the torpedo boat destroyers Lawrence and Whipple. The vessels when last seen were heading in a south-southeasterly direction

On Wednesday at noon the remainder of the fleet under Rear Admiral Barker will assume the defensive. Each vessel will hurry to a point assigned by secret instructions.
