The king has received with profound regret the news of the death of the marquis of Salisbury and his majesty deeply deplores the loss of so great a statesman, whose invaluable services to Queen Victoria, to the king and his country in the highest office of state, which he held for so many years, will ever dwell in the memory of his fellow countrymen.

Messages of condolence are pouring in at Hatfield house. The senders include King
