There were quite a few cars of cornfed steers in the yards this morning, and, while the choicest bunches sold at about steady prices, the short fed kinds were slow sale and undoubtedly lower. The top price of the day was only \$5.50, so there were no strictly choice cattle on sale. Although packers did not take hold very freely, prac-tically everything was sold in fairly good season. stuff was extremely light is nearly all the arrivals had to sell for feeders. Pack-ers all seemed to be anxious for supplies and bought up the few bunches of killers that were offered at good steady prices and claimed they did not have near enough to fill their orders. The feeder market was also in good shape as a lorge number of huvers atrived and
