Liberal Receipts of Cattle, but Good Beef Steers Held About Steady.

FAT STEERS were sold in last week's notches, but better grades of feeders were held steady.

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STILL PUTTING UP FENCES.

Wyoming Rangers Manifest Utter Indifference to Ruling of Government.

OMAHA MAN TELLS OF WHAT HE SAW. Robert C. Drusdow of Copper Belt Mining and Milling Company Says Townsite Has Been Laid Out.

"Despite the ruling of the government that cattle fences in the west shall come down, those in a certain portion of Wyoming are still standing, and not only that, but others are being built," said Robert C. Drusdow, who has just returned from near Lusk, Wyo.

"Cattle and sheep men are going right ahead," said Mr. Drusdow, "with the erection of their fences and nothing is heard of any ruling to the contrary by the government at Washington."

Mr. Drusdow, with A. H. Merchant of Omaha, J. M. Vanburg, a banker of Ft. E. M. Weston and L. Brown, capitalist of Winona, Minn., the latter mayor of Winona, are developing one of the most promising copper mines in the west, ten miles south of Lusk.

They have erected buildings to carry on the work of the camp, and a number of men are now at work getting at the ore, which runs at a high average.

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GOSSIP ON COMMISSION ROW.

The good old last year's bean is getting along to where he can be counted on to furnish a ration of cents.

Bananas have been cut off from their South American base by the gulf storms and have a hard time getting around to the office for business. So they have chucked up a 10-cent raise per 100 pounds for the week.
