AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMARA

Council Will Discuss the Matter of Paving Railroad Avenue.

ROAD TO BENEFIT SARPY FARMERS

Engineer Beal Says Thirty Thousand Square Yards of Paving is All Will Be Laid-Magic City Gossip.

Monday night the city council will take op the matter of paving Railroad avenue from Q street south to the county line. City Engineer Beal has been instructed to submit estimptes of the coast of the work. It is the intention of the city officials to provide this roadway for the benefit of the farmers who reside in Sarpy county and who do business in South Omaha. For years a better roadway along Railroad aveie has been asked for, not only by the Barpy county farmers, but by the people residing in Albright.

Engineer Beal says that the road to be paved will be 6,300 feet in length and 40 feet width from curb to curb. In all about 20,000 square yards of pavement will be needed. This pavement, Mr. Beal says, will cost in the neighborhood of \$3 per yard, whether of vitrified brick or stone. The street car company will be compelled to pave between its tracks. This will take off meven feet of the cost to the city.

In this connection there is some talk of the street car company extending its line south from Albright, and if a double track is laid, the cost of paving to the city will be decreased. As for curbing and guttering Engineer Beal favors cement, and if his plan is adopted the curbing will cost but little as compared with the stone curbing laid on the principal streets of the city. New Exchange Building.

Work on the new addition to the Live Stock Exchange building is progressing rapidly. Yesterday the new structure was inclosed and is now under roof. In the etyle of architecture the new building resembles the main building. This wing will afford much additional office room. A northern entrance will be provided and the building will be fitted for offices the same as the new Exchange building. It is expected that the addition will be completed and ready for occupancy in a couple of

East Side Improvement Club.

A moeting of the East Side Improvement club was held Friday night. J. J. Breen was elected president and J. L. Duff secretary. A committee was appointed to wait upon the officials of the street rallway company in relation to the extension of the car service on Twelfth street. Another committee was appointed to call upon the city council with a request that a police officer be detailed to patrol Twentieth street through Syndicate park when the street is opened. Members of the club are desirous of having Twentleth street opened, but the land company will not consent until the city provides an officer to patrol the park from noon until midnight. More fire hyfrants are wanted in the eastern portion of the city and particularly at Thirteenth and Missouri avenue, where it is stated that two dozen houses are entirely without fire protection. The committees appointed will report at a meeting to be held next Friday night.
