

COUNT TALKS OF HIS WOES Says He Intended No Forgery and Would Have Repaid Some Miller. RETURNS TO OMAHA WITH CHIEF DUNN Tells Officers that His Sister is Coming from France with Five Hundred Rubles, His Allowance.

"I am not feeling very well this morning and I don't care to talk. When my sister arrives from Aix La Raine, France, which will be in about three weeks, then I will make a statement," said the Count de Agnelli at police station yesterday, having just arrived from Albany, N. Y., under guard of Chief Detective Dunn, who had secured his return through requisition papers granted by Governor Odell.

"In America I am a plain American citizen," observed the count. "What I am in my own country, Russia, matters not. In New York, where I wrote checks galore, I am well known, and though sometimes I overdid my bank account, I am not suspected of trying to beat anyone and never was arrested. When my sister comes I will get my allowance of 500 rubles, amounting to \$50 in American money (I get an allowance, you know, every three months—this to Captain Haze, who intervened a question regarding where he got this money).

"My, my, it is all a mystery," the count continued, "how I ever came to give those two checks to Mr. Miller to sign. I meant him no wrong. I would have paid him back every cent, too. I was coming here—was selling cigars—good ones, too, and making \$10 a day to pay him with. I have had much trouble on my mind, you don't know how much. I was sent out of Russia by my father and a reconciliation has never been effected. We could have been reconciled in 1920, but he wanted me to give up my trade as a barber and I am an artist at my trade. I shaved President McKinley once. That was at the Palace Hotel in Denver. I had \$50 with which to pay Mr. Miller when I was arrested at Rochester. How did I get rid of it?"

And here the count related a tale of how he had been duped by a lawyer in Rochester and how the lawyer had got all his coin and then, not satisfied, had appropriated all his stock of cigars and some of his most precious razors.

Full of Nonsense and Dope. "This man filled my head full of nonsense and it was pretty full of morphine at the time," the count went on, "and made me think I could win out and not have to come back here. He caused me to spend all my money. "I was arrested at Rochester by McGuire. He asked me if I was the count and I said, 'If you want the count I guess the jig is up.' "Well, what did McGuire say to that?" asked Captain Haze. "He said I was a bunco man and I told him I didn't understand that kind of language. Then he asked me if I ever passed green goods. I told him no."

The count admitted that his father was a titled man of large estate and influenced in the ball world in Russia. He intimated his father was a real count, but avoided saying whether he was or not. He claims to be an ex-Philippine soldier and says he did battle in Luzon as a member of the Twenty-second Pennsylvania regiment.

The count's travel history consists in the alleged forgery of two \$10 checks to which he procured the signature of Roger Miller, for whom he was working as a barber. He fled from Omaha to Rochester, where he was apprehended. Chief Dunn went to Rochester and thence with the count to Albany and returned to return from Governor Odell. The time for his arraignment is not set.
