Will Make Woman Reformatory. The State Board of control will recommend that the idle buildings belonging to the state at Knoxville, which were erected for an industrial institution for the blind but which have been abandoned, shall be made use of for the woman's reformatory, which is now located by law at Anamosa. The reformatory has never been put in operation because there never was any appropriation for starting it and because the district judges object to committing persons to an institution that is connected with the state penitentiary. The Knoxville people at the last legislative session undertook to secure a state normal school for their idle buildings, but failed, and this project has been abandoned. They will not ask that a normal school be placed there now. The state board is in favor of having the buildings used as a reformatory where women who are too old to be sent to the industrial school for girls may be sent and who are not criminals subject to sentence to the penitentiary.
