DES MOINES, Oct. 12 .- After a journey of six weeks Mrs. Eather Steinberg and her three children, who were hidden in the cellar of a Christian home for three days during the Kishineff massacre, in Russia, have arrived in Des Moines to join Mr. Steinberg,

who has been here for two years. She brought with her pictures taken after the worst of the massacre and confirms all of the stories of horror which have been reported, and even more. She says the reports were mild compared with the awful facts of those three days she was hidden. She herself saw a woman with a spike driven into her skull, women disemboweled and hot pitch poured into their wounds, and men and women slashed and crushed and left lying in the streets.
