Significance of Visit.

The visit of Count Lamsdorff absorbs the attention of the public and the press, who attribute it to even more important ditical significance than to the visits of King Edward and King Victor Emmanuel to Paris. The newspapers generally agree 1,056. that the foreign minister will discuss the eastern and far eastern questions, but it is said in authoritative quarters today that the situation in the far east is not likely occupy so much attention as expected, since Admiral Alexieff, the Russian viceroy of the far east, has been given practically supreme authority over the Russian-

"Now," says the Novokari, "Is precisely moment for Russia to establish a political equilibrium in the east. The Japanese have falled in Formosa because they do not understand how to colonise. The efforts of the Japanese to obtain settlements in Corea, having their own jurisdiction, would lead to the subjection of the Coreans and impair the sovereignty of

"Japan has not explained the status of a European state and cannot be entrusted with the rights of the European ploneers of civilisation. On the continent all that can be tolerated is the immigration of Japanese into Corea under control."

The first formal conference between Count Lamsdorff and M. Delcasse occurred

at the Foreign office this afternoon. The Russian foreign minister remained fully an hour with M. Deicasse. Later the two statesmen proceeded together to the Eylson palace, where President Loubet received Count Lamsdorff, who gave the president of the French republic an autograph letter from the caar. The conference at the Elysee lasted over an hour. This evening Prince Ourouseff gave a small and select dinner at the Russian embassy, at which Count Lamsdorff and M. Delcasse again were brought together. Among those present at the dinner were Count Cassini, Russian ambassador at Washington, and Count Benckendorff, Russian ambassador at London. The presence of Count Cassini is construed to indicate that the attitude of the United States is a factor in the present discussions.
