We originally started to investigate the wastage of water in connection with these old fixtures, but we find from your letter of February B. 1823, to James B. Clow & Sons. Chicago, that your board had aircady, investigated this matter and found that up to February B. 1823, your saving op water bill had been 35 per cent and since this date the saving has been much greater. We find before this plumbing work was started that the plumbing was in a most unashitary condition and the heating needed overhauling. We found that the closets in particular were resting on the floor without any connections to hold them to the waste pipes, allowing the sewer gas to escape into the rooms, entailing great danger from disease. The urnals were of an obsolete pattern, and in the insane ward we are informed that there was no water connection to flush the urinal bowls. In fact, the plumbing had been installed about fourteen years ago and besides being practically worn out the style and pattern of fixtures and work has been so greatly improved on that it was necessary to make almost a complete new job.

Secretary Hitchcock Takes Steps to Protest Legal Rights of Those Accused of Killing Wyoming Sheriff.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.- The president has acquiesced in the retirement of Oliver P. Shiras, judge of the federal court for the northern district of lows, to take effect November I. In doing so President Rooseveit expressed himself in the following complimentary letter:

It is with great regret that I accept your resignation. I cannot allow the occasion to pass without congratulating you upon the signal success which has marked your labors on the rederal bench and I frust that the period of retirement upon which you are about to enter and which you have earned so well will be as full of satisfaction to you as the period of your service was full of usefulness to the nation.


