REPORT ON THE POOR FARM Investigating Committee Declares Conditions to Be Dangerous to Health.

Orders Immediate Improvement Made Money Poorly Expended by County Commission—Defects Noted in Great Numbers—Report is Referred to Committee.

Methods of county commissioners in the letting of contracts were exposed yesterday morning in the session of the commission.

During the early part of the year a protest had gone up asking that the foul air and unsanitary conditions at the poor farm be remedied.

The report of the committee showed a grand total of plumbing, sewerage and steam heating work at the county farm, during the past two years to be \$4,983.30.

Speaking upon the original condition of the plumbing in the county poor farm the report of the committee includes the following:

Report of Committee. We originally started to investigate the sewage of water in connection with these old fixtures, but we find from your letter of February 11, 1903, to James B. Clow & Sons, Chicago, that you had already investigated this matter and found that up to February 11, 1903, your saving on water bill had been 20 per cent and since this date the saving has been much greater.

Following the reading of the report Mr. Harste said the inmates of the poor farm should have relief; that to compel human beings to live in such a "hole" was a condition which would soon become insufferable.

JUDGE O. P. SHIRAS RETIRES President Acknowledges Years of Faithful Service in Approving Action.

Secretary Hitchcock Takes Steps to Protest Legal Rights of Those Accused of Killing Wyoming Sheriff.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The president has acquiesced in the retirement of Oliver P. Shiras, judge of the federal court for the northern district of Iowa, to take effect November 1.

It is with great regret that I accept your resignation. I cannot allow your resignation to pass without your acknowledgment of the period of retirement upon which you are about to enter and which you have earned so well.

The commissioner of Indian affairs today received the following telegram concerning the Indian situation from Agent Brennan of the Pine Ridge agency, dated yesterday at Hot Springs, S. D.:

A sheriff and posse from Wyoming arrested nine Indians and their families near Edgemont, S. D., last night. They are supposed to be part of the party engaged in the night raiding.

In accordance with this recommendation the secretary of the interior has requested the governor of Wyoming to protect the Indians under arrest. It also has been decided to send Special Agent McNichol to the scene of the recent conflict to make inquiry concerning it.

Have reports that the sheriff arrested nine Indians and their families near Edgemont, S. D., who are supposed to be part of the party engaged in the night raiding.

Secretary Hitchcock has also made a formal request of the attorney general for legal protection for the Indians under arrest so far as he is able to grant it.

By PIERRE, Nov. 5.—Hon. E. A. Hitchcock, secretary of the interior, Washington, D. C., answering a communication from the sheriff at Douglas, S. D., says:

Admiral O'Neil, chief of the naval ordnance bureau, today received a telegram from Captain Perry, in temporary charge of the Brooklyn navy yard, stating that from six to nine men were killed, five injured, and shell houses No. 1 and 2, with their contents, destroyed by the explosion of the naval magazine on Iona island.

Some time ago General Davis, commanding the division of the Philippines, recommended a reduction of the garrison in those islands, and the secretary of war authorized the chief of staff to determine what reduction should be made.

METHODISTS ASSIGN FUNDS Church Extension Board Passes Upon Applications of Conferences for Money.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 5.—The general committee of church extension of the Methodist Episcopal church, now in session here, by a vote of 27 to 8 rejected the plan to consolidate home missions and church extension benevolences.

LOSES LEG FROM ACCIDENT Young Man Tries to Catch Car Between Cross Streets and is Hurled Beneath.

In an attempt to catch a street car moving swiftly between Paul and Hamilton streets on North Twenty-fourth yesterday Charles Edmunds was thrown under the car and had his left leg crushed at the ankle so badly that amputation was decided to be necessary and an operation was performed at 10 o'clock.

The car was moving south at the usual rate of speed when young Edmunds ran out from the pavement and attempted to catch the handlebars of the motorcar's cab. It was crowded and was not stopping as necessary as it was not a stopping place.

Charles Edmunds resided with his parents at 1408 North Twenty-fifth street. He is employed by the Barklaik Bros. News agency and was going to work when the accident occurred.

WESTERN MATTERS AT CAPITAL Appointments in the Postal and Rural Mail Service in Nebraska and Iowa.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Ed Mathison has been appointed regular and Maggie Mathison substitute rural carrier at Panora, Ia.

These Nebraska rural routes will be established December 1: Garrison, Butler county, one route; area covered, thirty-two square miles; population, 430. Peru, Nebraska county, one additional; area covered, twenty-six square miles; population, 430.

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TARIFF FIGHT PREDICTED Senator Teller Believes Extra Session Will Not Pass Reciprocity Bill.

There Seems to Be Difference of Opinion Between House and Senate as to Way to Enact New Law.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—There were some interesting developments today as to the method of congressional procedure on the Cuban reciprocity treaty.

It has been generally supposed that a joint resolution or a bill approving the treaty would be all that was necessary, but members of the house, and some senators, take an entirely different view.

Representative Tawney of Minnesota, who was leader of the republican majority that opposed the reciprocity bill in the last congress, said today that the provision requiring congressional approval, when inserted in the treaty, was known to him to be defective and open to constitutional objections.

The treaty of 1823 with Great Britain for reciprocity with Canada and the reciprocity treaty of 1857 with Mexico, he added, both contained a provision at the very beginning stating that when suitable legislation was enacted by congress to carry out the provision of the treaties then the president should issue a proclamation announcing the fact and the treaty thereupon should become effective.

Mr. Tawney contends that to approve the treaty by a simple resolution would be void and asserts that the sugar provision of the treaty is nothing more than a pledge of good faith of the government that the tariff on sugar shall not be changed during the life of the treaty.

The finance committee, which meets tomorrow, will take up the subject of the form of legislation necessary to carry the treaty into effect.

Mr. Payne, who is to be chairman of that committee, said he could not make any definite statement as to the form of legislation until he had consulted all members of the committee, but it was his opinion that the measure in form would be a bill rather than a resolution, as he did not see how the house could do otherwise.

Senators Allison, Aldrich, Spooner and Pitt of Connecticut arrived in Washington tonight and immediately went into conference in Senator Allison's apartments at the Arlington hotel.

At the conclusion Senator Allison said he believed the Cuban treaty would be made operative by joint resolution. He cited the method adopted by congress in relation to the Mexican treaty of immediately after the Mexican treaty was made operative.

The special committee appointed by the senate at the last session to prepare a financial bill to be submitted for consideration of the fifty-eighth session of congress had not prepared a draft of its ideas, and Senator Allison said tonight he does not look for much financial legislation.
