Minister Varilla talked to an Associated Press reporter at the hotel where he has temporarily established his legation.

"My plans," he said, "it is, perhaps, a little premature for me to speak. I shall call at the State department tomorrow and will deposit my views on my conference with the officials there how rapidly canal negotiations can proceed.

"How soon do you expect to be recognized by the other powers?" the minister was asked.

"Very shortly," was the reply. France has already indicated unofficially its willingness to follow the lead of the United States, thereby showing its appreciation of the Washington government's high motives.

"The two treaties signed will be one more associated with the great enterprise of the Panama Canal and the United States will finish."

Minister Varilla expressed his appreciation of the government's attitude of Colombia and its absolute disregard of the rights of property in preventing the execution of a project vital to the world.
