DEMOCRATS ARE FOR TREATY. Vote for Cuban Reciprocity, According to Action of Caucus.

PROPOSE IMPORTANT AMENDMENT. Leader Instructed to Secure Vote on Same, but in Spite of Sugar Interests Bill Will Be Favored.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—After discussion of the Cuban reciprocity measure for several hours in caucus tonight, the members of the house agreed on a resolution by a vote of 86 to 15, pledging themselves to support the bill, after effecting amendments to secure its amendment, abolishing the differential on refined sugar and eliminating the five year clause of the treaty.

COLOMBIANS BOUND TO WAR. Premises to Spill Last Drop of Blood to Whip Panama.

SO PROCLAIMS TO THE UNIVERSE. People in Bogota Decline to Be Calmed and Only Direct Encounter with Isthmus Forces Will Satisfy.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Cabling from Panama, the correspondent of the Herald says: Direct communication has been re-established with Bogota, capital of Colombia.

BERLIN, Nov. 14.—Germany's consular representatives at Panama have opened business relations with the new government, which action Germany subsequently sanctioned.

Never Any More Warfare There. RIPS SUMMERS' SELF-PRaise. A Friend of Harry Lindsay's Calls Attention to the Great District Attorney's Real Record.

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SUMMERS IS TO BE OUSTED. Senator Dietrich and Congressman Kinkaid Tell President of His Methods.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—This was Nebraska day at the White House. Early this morning Mr. Roosevelt had a conference with the president concerning matters in Nebraska.

Tells of Summers' Threats. The real business of the day then began. Senator Dietrich Congressman Kinkaid, R. B. Schneider and Mr. Roosevelt were invited into a conference previously arranged by Senator Dietrich and in which Senator Hanna was also invited to participate.

Senator Dietrich followed with a statement wherein he charged Summers with an attempt to extort an endorsement from him by threats. Summers had attempted to make Kinkaid believe that he had rendered him a great service in suppressing the publication of a compromising letter and offered furthermore to do him an additional service by pressing an indictment against a postmaster in western Nebraska whose position Kinkaid would be privileged to fill.

When this proposal was made Kinkaid stated that he did not care the publication of the letter which had been circulated in fact during his last campaign with the date so blurred that the impression was left that it had been written while Bartley was treasurer and related to state funds when in fact the letter related to a private loan made by Judge Kinkaid's bank to Bartley before the latter had assumed office.

Senator Dietrich asked Mr. Schneider to tell of a somewhat similar experience but the president cut him short by remarking that he did not want to hear anything further, that Judge Kinkaid's statement was sufficient and that Summers' service would be dispensed with.

WICHITA GETS DECISION. Interstate Commerce Commission Holds that Roads in Kansas Violate Law. GRAIN AND LUMBER RATE MUST BE LOWER. Railroads Win on Showing as to Coal Rates, but City May Submit More Evidence at Later Date.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The Interstate Commerce commission in decisions announced today in three cases brought by the city of Wichita, Kan., against the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, Rock Island and other roads in that territory declares that both the export rates on grain from Wichita to Galveston and the lumber rates from west of the Mississippi river points in Louisiana, Arkansas and Texas to Wichita, are unreasonable and should be reduced.
