

SECOND CORPORATION IS IN

Nebraska Telephone Company Files Personal Property Tax Schedule.

LESS THAN AMOUNT FIXED LAST YEAR

Other Corporations Fail to Make Returns and This is Last Day on Which They May Do So.

Secretary E. M. Moran of the Nebraska Telephone company has filed the personal property schedule of that corporation with Tax Commissioner Fleming for the 1936 city assessment.

Secretary Moran makes the return in a typewritten sworn statement that "the sum of \$15,885, in my opinion, is the full cash value of all personal property, including franchise, owned by said company and subject to assessment for taxation in the city of Omaha for the assessment of the year 1936."

Increase in Capital.

On February 12 of the present year the capitalization of the company was increased from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000, the \$1,000,000 additional shares being placed immediately on the market.

Aside from the electric light and telephone companies other public service and private corporations have not returned schedules to the tax department.

Saturday there was a great rush of small property owners and business men to get their schedules filed.

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The tax department is silent on the question of railroad assessments.

GRANT CEASES HIS REPAIRS

Quits Work on Streets Except Few Holes to Be Filled Next Week.

Asphalt paving repairs by the city in connection with John Grant and the Nebraska Bitulithic plant have ceased, practically. Some work is being done at the foot of Harney street, and a few of the street holes will be filled next week, but the funds available have been exhausted and there is nothing to do but to quit, although the mayor declares that if the Barber Asphalt company declines to finish the repairs radical measures of some kind will be taken to put the unrepaved streets in passable condition.

A hole in the pavement at the corner of Fourteenth and Harney streets is what Bertha C. Best, 305 California street, holds responsible for an injury to her ankle sustained November 4 while stepping from a street car. Therefore she inclines to the belief that the city should pay damages and has filed a notice to this effect.

COMPLETE THE PRELIMINARY

Water Works Apprentices Finish First Labors and Depart from the City.

The board of water works apprentices have finished the preliminary inspection of the distributing system and left the city. More than a score of excavations were made and the pipe pierced at as many points. The general result, according to the city engineering department, is that the pipe was found in good condition.

No evidence of electrolysis were found in several examinations made near the power house of the street railway company. The date of the next session in Omaha will be announced later, together with the further program of the board.

It is understood, although not verified, that the board will make reports separately on the value of the water works property in Omaha and South Omaha, so that if litigation follows the valuation may be of service without a division of the appraisal.

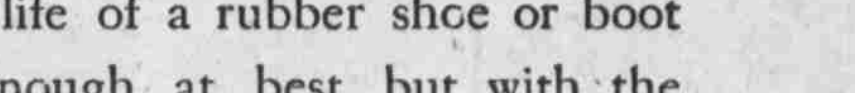
