A member of the East Side club said to a reporter for The Bee yesterday:

"It is high time that South Omaha had a series of parks. In the first place there cheap. CATTLES—Considering the fact that there were but five market days this week receipts of cattle were fairly liberal, as there is but a slight decrease, as compared with last week, and as compared with the corresponding week of last year there is a slight increase. The demand, though, has been equal to the occasion and prices have held up is good shape.

Quite a few cornfed steers have been on sale this week and some of them have been good enough to bring from \$5.00 to \$5.10. As compared with the close of last week cornled steers may safely be quoted stronger and in some cases sales have looked a little higher. Warned up stuff is still neglected and, in fact, is hard to sell at any figure. Quite a few cattle of that kind sell below \$4.00, or little better than grassers. Fair to good cornfeds go from \$4.26 to \$4.50, and good to choice from that up to \$5.15.

The cow market has been in good shape

SHEEP-There were a few sheep reported this morning, but they were said to arrive and as a result a test of the market was not made. For the week receipts have only been about half as large as for last week, and as compared with the same week of last year there is a decrease amounting to about 11,600 head.

The demand on the part of local packers has been in good shape all the week for desirable grades and very little change in ruling prices is noted from those paid af the close of last week. The supply of cornfeds is rapidly increasing, but the quality is still rather poor except in a few cases. Unless the sheep have been fes for some time the prices paid are little better than those given for grassers.

The demand for feeders has also been about equal to the supply and prices are practically the same as they were a week ago.


