RAILROADS WIN VICTORY

Missouri Supreme Court Permits Injunction Against St. Louis Ticket Scalpers. Injunction secured by Five Roads Last July Are Effective, as Supreme Court Denies Writ of Prohibition.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Dec. 23.-The supreme court today denied the writ of prohibition asked for by St. Louis ticket brokers against railroads entering that city, to enjoin the circuit court from enforcing injunctions preventing the sale by them of excursion tickets for World's Fair traffic, on the ground that the lower court has the jurisdiction in such cases.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 23.-The writ of prohibition denied by the supreme court was secured by the brokers last July for the purpose of withholding the effect of the injunction issued against them by the St. Louis circuit court on the petition of five prominent western railroads.

He was convicted in 1899 and sentenced to imprisonment in the Missouri penitentiary for six years.
