GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Befreatieral Break Occurs in the High Price of May Wheat.

THROW MILLIONS OF BUSHELS ON MARKET

Other Grains Suffer with Wheat, Corn and Oats Closing at a Loss, but Praviatons Remain Strong.

CHICAGO, Jan. 25.—A sensational break of \$\frac{1}{2}\text{c}\$ coccurred today in the price of \$May\$ wheat Sales of millions of bushels for May delivery by the interest that had been actively supporting prices was the prime factor in changing a strong market into one of utter weakness. There was a little recovery from the low point but the close was weak with May 20 under Saturday's final figures. Other grains suffered with wheat, May corn closing at a loss of \$\frac{1}{2}\text{c}\$ and oats \$\frac{1}{2}\text{c}\$. Provisions ruled strong and closed \$\frac{1}{2}\text{c}\$ in these fears there was an urgent demand from shorts at the opening. May was \$\frac{1}{2}\text{c}\$ to \$\frac{1}{2}\text bulge and another reaction followed. The close was weak with May 2 cents under Saturday's close. January delivery was relatively firmen. After opening %6%c higher at 82%c to 83%c the price advanced to 83%c. declined to 81%c. a loss of 2%c. The close was %c higher. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 567,000 bushels. The amount on passage increased 2,224,000 bushels, while the visible supply decreased 2,7000 bushels. Minneapolis. Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 461 cars against 685 last week and 1,003 a year ago.

In consequence of the big break in wheat the corn market showed surprising strength. Influential buying by local traders on the pour showing of the grain coming in maintained a firm tone during the early part of the session. Later in the day prices were unable to withstand the severe strain caused by the slump in wheat and an easier tone prevailed, although the siling was only moderate. May opened 40%c to 4c higher, at 40% 40%c, sold up to 60%c, and after reacting to 43%c, closed at 40%c. Local receipts were 430 cars, 20 of contract grade.

There was a good demand for oats throughout the sreater part of the sessions, offerings being well taken until near the close, when the selling became too liberal for the demand. A slight decline was experienced late in the day and an easier tone prevailed at the finish. The buil leader was again an active supporter of the market. Small receipts and an excellent ship-
