WASHINGTON, Feb. II .- Today President Roosevelt issued the following proclamation declaring the neutrality of this government in the Russo-Japanese war: By the president of the United States of

A proclamation:
Whereas, A state of war unhappily exists between Japan, on the one side, and Russia, on the other side;
And whereas, The United States are on terms of friendship and amity with both the contending powers and with the persons inhabiting the several dominions;
And whereas, There are citizens of the United States residing within the territories or dominions of each of the said belligerents and carrying on commerce, trade, or other business or pursuits therein, protected by the faith of treates.

And whereas, There are subjects of each of the said belligerents residing within the territory or jurisdiction of the United States and carrying on commerce, trade, A proclamation:

the territory or jurisdiction of the United States and carrying on commerce, trade, or other business or pursuits therein; And whereas, The laws of the United States without interfering with the free expression of opinion and sympathy, or with the open manufacture or sale of arms or munitions of war, nevertheless impose the point of the contest; and purisdiction the duty of an impartial neutrality during the existence of the contest; And whereas, it is the duty of a neutral

government not to permit or suffer the making of its waters subservient to the purposes of war: Now, therefore, I. Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, president of the United States of America, in order to preserve the neutrality of the United States and of their critizens and of persons within their territory and jurisdiction and to enforce their laws and treaties of the United States in this behalf and of the law of nations, may thus be prevented from unintentional violation of the same, do hereby declare and proclaim that by the act passed on the 12th day of April, ISIS, A. D., commonly known as the "Neutrality law," the following acts are forbidden to be done, under severe penalties, within the territory and jurisdiction of the United States, to wit:

### Acts Forbidden by Law.

1. Exercising a commission to serve either of the said beliigerents, by land or by sea, against the other beliigerent.

2. Enlisting or entering into service of either of the said beliigerents as a soldier or as a marine or seaman on board of any vessel of war, letter of marque or privateer.

3. Hiring or retaining another person to enlist or enter himself in the service of either of the said beliigerents as a noidier or as a marine or seaman on board of any vessel of war, letter of marque or privateer.

4. Hiring another person to go beyond the limits or jurisdiction of the United States with intent to be emisted as aforesaid.
5. Hiring another person to go beyond the limits of the United States with intent to be entered into service as aforesaid.

6. Retaining another person to go beyond the limits of the United States with intent a. Retaining another person to go beyond the limits of the United States with fixent to be enlisted as aforesaid.

7. Retaining another person to go beyond the limits of the United States to be entered into the service of the aforesaid. (But the said act is not to be construed to extend to a citizen of either, beiligerent, who, being transiently within the United States, shall, on board of another vessel of war which at the time of its arrival within the United States was fitted and equipped as such vessel of war, enlist or enter himself or hire or retain another subject or citizen of the same belligerent who is transiently within the United States to enlist or enter himself to serve such belligerent on board such vessel of war, if the United States shall then be at peace with such belligerent.

8. Fitting out and arming, or attempting to fit out and arm, or procuring to be fitted out and armed, or knowingly being concerned in the furnishing, fitting out or arming of any ship or vessel with mtent that such ship or vessel shall be employed in the service of either of the belligerents.

# RUMOR OF ANOTHER FIGHT Japanese Also Suffer

It appears from the latest reports that the Japanese success at Port Arthur in the opening scene of the war was bought at considerable expense to themselves. Of the four torpedo boats which entered the barbor and torpedoed the Russian ships, three of them were sunk, and it is supposed their crews perished with them. Latest information is to the effect that they made no effort at concealment, but were seen by the Russian officers, who mistook them for ships of their own, as they were

displaying the Russian signals. There are rumors of a further naval battle off Port Arthur, in which it is said a number of Russian ships were either captured or destroyed. This rumor, however, lacks confirmation.

The Japanese have made several ineffectual attempts to land in the

vicinity of Port Arthur. The report that the Manchurian railway has been temporarily disabled by the blowing up of a bridge has been confirmed. This is likely to be a serious blow, as even the temporary stoppage of communication at this stage may be costly.

"The officer informed his captain that the approaching boats were Japanese. The captain dealed this and said they were built in Port Arthur. The artillery officer insisted that they were Japanese and the esptain became angry, saying:
