SOME ACTION EXPECTED AFTER TUESDAY

Iowa Delegation Takes Kindly to the Suggestion of Sending Two Senators and the Governor to Chicago Convention.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON Feb 20 -(Special Teles gram.)-Until after the ratification of the Panama treaty, the vote on which will be taken Tuesday, at an hour yet to be fixed, the special committee charged with the Dietrich investigation, it is understood. will not have a meeting to fix the scope of the inquiry. Monday being a legal holiday considerable time will be taken up in reading Washington's farewell address, which this year will be read by Senator Heyburn of Idaho. After the reading it is thought the senate will go into executive session for the purpose of considering the Panama treaty. Tuesday the senate will be in executive session the major portion of the day, several senators still destring to talk on the treaty. Members of the special committee have flatly refused to give any expressions of opinion as to the scope of the investigation or whether witnesses will be summoned to Washington. Whether the meetings will be secret or open to the public is also yet to be determined. Should they be executive, witnesses who will be summoned to Washington will appear before five distinguished lawyers whose ability on cross-exemination is well known. Until the committee can have a meeting to determine the course of action everything is problematical

Lincoln Prefers a Request.

Congressman Burkett is in receipt of a resolution passed by the city council of I incoin requesting the government to permit the use of the court room in the federal building and the two rooms adjacent for city council purposes. For some time it looked as if Governor Cummins would make a fight to control the delegation-at-large, the governor himself heading the delegation, for the purpose of going on the committee of resolutions and urging before that committee a plank favoring Canadian reciprocity. Governor Cummins, however, so far as can be ascertained, has made no move toward realizing an ambition to nominate the delegates-atlarge slace the announcement was made that President Roosevelt disclaimed any iniention whatsoever of interfering in the politics of lowa, but desired Senators Allison and Dolliver on the delegation. The president realizes that conservation must be the watchword in 1904, and while he is anxious to have Governor Cummins go to Chicago, he is not wholly in sympathy with the movement to fasten reciprocity with Canada upon the party in the coming campaign. Marines Go to Orient.


