ALL SOIL IS MOIST ENOUGH

Entire Territory Covered by Burlington in Nebraska Gets Some Rain.

EASTERN PART HAS HEAVY FALLETTS

Summary of Live Stock, Fruit and Agricultural Conditions in State After Week of Rather Stron- sious Weather.

The Burlington crop report which covers conditions on the lines of the system west of Omaha, says the soil in eastern Nebraska including the Kansas line from Odell to Concordia, as far west as Grand Island, Hastings and Red Cloud is in excellent condition for this season of the year. On the southern division especially, showers have been general during the week, except on the west end of the DeWitt-Holdrege line and wet weather has to some extent retarded spring work.

On the northern division there has been less rain, but no part of the division is present suffering from moisture. Considerable rain has fallen on the southern division during the week in the Republican valley, from Red Cloud to Cambridge on the Kansas branches, and on the line from Kansas to Cambridge via Holdrege. Some rain has fallen at places west of Cambridge, between Wray and Akron for instance, the fall was nearly an inch and this small strip of territory looks well; west of Akron very little rain has fallen. There has been some rain between Holdrege and Curtis and the soil is in fair condition; west of Curtis no rain has fallen during the week, and the ground is exceedingly dry.

The Alliance division has had very little rain since the last report and the ground west of Broken Bow, except in the Black Hills, is generally dry.

On the Sheridan division the weather has been cold during the week. Grass is beginning to start on the ranges, however, and they look well. Soil conditions are reported favorable for such farming as is usually done in that section.

Not much progress has been made in spring plowing on the two eastern divisions, especially on the southern. On this division the ground is not in fit condition on account of its being too wet. Some plowing has, however, been done during the week. Oats and spring wheat have been sowed to quite an extent as far west as Broken Bow, Curtis and Cambridge. The Kansas branches are reported in good condition

on the western division and much spring plowing and seeding has been done. The indications are that the average amount of spring grain will be sown generally in the Burlington territory.

Wheat generally is in good condition. There is prospect for a full crop as far west as Red Cloud, Hastings and Grand Island. A half crop is the best that can be expected for considerable distances west of Curtis, Indianola and Seneca. On the Alliance division the crop is not in good condition; no rain there during the week, and the ground is very dry.

It is impossible to state as yet just how much damage has been done to fruit by the recent blizzard. The indications are that the peach crop has suffered most.

Pastures, meadows and ranges are reported in good condition. The ranges between Seneca and Alliance need rain. No report has been received showing that stock wintered badly. All reports state that stock is in good or fair condition.

Railway Notes and Personal.

J. A. Kuhn, assistant general passenger and freight agent of the Nebraska and Wyoming division of the Northwestern, left for Chicago Tuesday evening.

The Rock Island has announced a reduction of 5 cents in the rate on beer between Omaha and St. Louis. The new rate is 25 cents per 100 and the old rate was 30 cents per 100 and the one now in effect is 25 cents.

George A. McDonough, immigration agent of the Union Pacific, has just returned from a trip to California. He reports conditions splendid on the coast and was particularly struck with the commercial center in and around Stockton, where he spent most of his visit. He says the Stockton flour mills are running very steadily and sending large supplies of flour to the Orient.

The Burlington is putting on through trains via Chicago from California to St. Louis to take care of the passenger traffic which is expected to increase during the World's Fair. Special trains will also be put on via Billings from the northwest to Louisiana and an increased business from that section of the country. No through trains have heretofore been run by Burlington via these points.

J. Francis, general passenger agent of the B. & M., left Tuesday evening for Kansas City, where he went to take a special train for Santa Barbara, Cal., to attend the meeting of the Transcontinental Passenger association. The special train which will carry the members of the association left Chicago via the Santa Fe and will go west through Kansas City. It is thought that the meeting will last until about May 1.

Word has been received at Union Pacific headquarters from George Scribner, who was formerly chief clerk in the tax department of the road. He has just entered the service of the San Pedro line in the department of Auditor Bertie. He says that since leaving this city his health has improved very much and that he feels good at the present time and is recovering his former strength. From Omaha he went to Honolulu, from which place he recently returned to California to assume his new duties.

Tom Hughes, traveling passenger agent of the Missouri Pacific, has just returned from St. Louis, where he spent a few days looking over the exposition grounds. He says many wonders are to be seen when the fair is thrown open to the public. One of the things which impressed him the most is the method of providing shade trees for the grounds. Large trees are being taken up from their native health and replanted on the grounds in rows. Some of these trees are over a foot in diameter and it requires a flat car to transport each tree.
