

defining Brazil's position in the boundary dispute with Feru, the Peruvian legation today made a counter statement to the following effect:

today made a counter statement to the following effect: Peru has never admitted in Brazil any right whatsoever to the territory actually in dispute. The treaty of ISI contains no recognition in Brazil's rights, as alleged by the Brazilian legation. The treaty is one of amity and commerce and made no refer-ence as to the territory now in dispute. According to late reports it would seem that the government of Brazil instead of framing its policy in accordance with the provision of its constitution, which pro-vides for the settlement of International disputes by arbitration, has assumed hostile attitude and taken steps by no means conditive to the pacific solution it has pledged itself to seek. According to press reports a garrison on the Yuraru fiver not long ago was as-saulted by 200 Brazilian (roops, with the result that some of the Privilans were massacred and some made prisoners and taken to Manson where the Brazilian offi-clais set them free, stating that neither the central nor local governments were re-spondible for auch assault. Such would not have been the attitude of Brazilian officials toward the Peruvian soldiers had they thought for a moment they had in-vaded Brazilian territory. Peru today is destrous of resorting to arbitration, with-out demanding previous conditions, un-necessary to governments really wishing to reach a prompt, just and pacific settlement. The Brazilian legation tonight issued the following additional statement regarding the boundary dispute with Peru:

following additional statement regarding the boundary dispute with Peru: In the message addressed by Rodrigues Alves, president of Brazil, on the occasion of the organing of Congress May 4, the fol-lowing is said in regard to the reliations between Brazil and the republics of Bolivia and Peru: "The difficulties which existed between Brazil and Bolivia were settled by the treaty of Petropolis, which, under a loyal execution, will contribute to strengthen the friendly relations of the two people and develop their commercial intercourse. The Peruvian government wished that its rep-rementative participate in the negotiations and soon after proposed that the boundary questions between the three countries be submitted to arbitration. The Braisilian government could not accede to these pro-posals, on the consideration that it was none of the litigants and then come to an understanding with the other. Origin of a Common Custom Rigidly Observed for Many Centuries

In 1865 two children, a boy and a girl, were similarly consigned to a living grave by some laborers working on a blockhouse at Duga, in Asiatic Turkey. 

Vast quantities of this coal are found near Bismarck, N. D., and mines near the town are opened up so that more than 1,000 tons a day are taken out. It is almost the only kind of fuel used there and its consumption in Fargo and other nearby

towns is enormous. The method of mining is unique. Usually the mines are entered by means of a drift, which taps the vein of coal at a depth of forty to fifty feet. This is done in sections, so that the whole mine is a series of galleries divided by coal partitions. Later these are removed and blasting with electricity enormous chunks of coal are blown down. These are carted away after the miners have broken them and put them in the receiving cars. Immense chutes carry the lignite to the cars which are walting on the tracks, and so expert is the whole process, even at this initial stage, that the raw material costs only 40
