ARGUMENT BETWEE .. REPRESENTATIVES

Conclusion of the Presentation of the Brazilian Case in the Controversy Over Boundary Lines.

WASHINGTON, May 13.-Notwithstanding reports by cable to the effect that Peru has consented to withdraw her troops from the Acre region now in dispute between Peru and Brazil, it is said that the offer is coupled with the demand for the neutralization of the territory, the crisis has not been averted. Meanwhile the argument between the representatives of the two countries in Washington continues and the latest contribution, which it is said marks a conclusion of the presentation of the Brazilian case, was given to the press today from the Brazilian legation.

The statement follows: The interpretation given by Brazil to the The interpretation given by Brazii to the treaty of 1661 mas always been the same and the only one compatible with international law, namely, that by the principle Uti Possidetis as adopted in the treaty of 1861. Peru recognized the territorics to the south and east of the Yavary as belonging to Brazil.

The Uti Possidetis, as outlined by the Peruvian legation pased upon a colonial

Peruvian legation bases upon a title, the treaty of St. Ildetonso of title, the treaty of St. ildefonso of 117 is unfortunately a novelty, for it would amount to basing right on a treaty nultiple and void by international law as well as by the recognition of Portugal and spain and the South American nations, after their independence. That treaty, in fact, became invalid in consequence of the war which broke out in 1801 before Portugal and Spain, and never since was re-established.
