Receiver Sues for Securities.

STORM LAKE, Ia., May 21.-(Special.)-A. J. Wilson, receiver for the First National bank of this city, has commenced an action in the federal court in Sioux City against A. H. Smith, a Storm Lake jeweler, to regain certain securities which the bank before it closed turned over to Mr. Smith as collateral for his deposits in the institution. His deposits amounted to about \$1.800. The notes have since been collected by Smith and he has appropriated the proceeds, but refuses to turn the same over to the bank, which he was ordered to do by the comptroller of the currency on the ground that the turning over to him of the collateral notes was not a legal transaction by the bank. Attorney F. F. Faville is representing the receiver, while William Milchrist of Sloux City appears for Mr. Smith in the suit.
