


OPENING DEVIL'S LAKE RESERVE President Signs Proclamation Fixing

The land is to be disposed of by a registration and drawing similar to that provided for the opening of the ceded lands of the Rosebud reservation in South Dakota by recent proclamation.

The Devil's lake Indian reservation contains about 88,000 acres of land, of which approximately 550 homestead entries may be made. The registration will be made at Devil's Lake and Grand Forks, N. D. and will begin August 8 and run until August 20. The drawing will be held at Devil's Lake, beginning August 24. The entries must be made at the Devil's Lake land office and will begin at 8 o'clock or September 6 and will proceed for sixty


