SERIOUS WRECK IN IOWA

One Man Dead as Result of Accident on Milwaukee Road.

OMAHA CITIZEN AMONG THE INJURED

Seventeen Persons Injured More or Less Severely When Train Strikes Washout in the Dark Near Perry.

PERRY, Ia., June 2.—(Special Telegram)—Train No. 6 on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad was wrecked last night a mile and a half east of Bouton and four miles east of Perry.

A heavy rain about 10 o'clock washed out the track. The engine passed over in safety, taking the mail car over with it, excepting one pair of trucks. The baggage car, the smoker and a chair car stopped, one end on the track and the other in the ditch in three feet of water. The dining car was telescoped at both ends by the tourist and sleeping cars. Superintendent Foster's car on the rear was undamaged.

No one was killed outright, but Robert Shaffer of Milwaukee had his skull crushed and had died since. Following are the injured: J. M. Murphy, baggage man, jaw broken. R. E. Dewitt, messenger, Irving Park, Ill., left side crushed. J. C. Gleason, Omaha, chest crushed. M. I. Begley, Chicago, foot injured. Emeric, Tipton, Ia., knee and head. B. Skilton, Perry, Ia., head cut. R. O. Adams, Grand Island, Neb., knees. R. Tanner, a waiter, head bruised. F. L. Chicago, porter, back injured. D. C. Haplast, Des Moines, leg injured. Mrs. E. M. Preston, Coon Rapids, Ia., suffering from shock. Ell Morin, news agent, St. Paul, leg and arm bruised. W. McDonald, mail clerk, slight bruises. James Matteson, Egan, S. D., head and neck injured.

Conductor Zimmer was thrown into the end of the car but not hurt. Engineer Selee was running fifty miles an hour when the train struck the washout. A heavy rain, amounting to a cloudburst, had just passed over and the culvert was full of water. Two miles west of Perry was running across the track at the time of the accident. A relief train left here with four doctors and every one was cared for. All were thoroughly wet for an hour before help came. At midnight train No. 2 took the uninjured passengers, running by way of

RICHARDS CONDUCTS LAND SALES

Commissioner Has Three Big Jobs in the West.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(Special Telegram)—W. A. Richards, commissioner general of the land office, left Washington tonight with his daughters for Brighton, Colo. Mr. Richards' youngest daughter last winter while skating fell and suffered a severe sprain to her right ankle. The sprain has not been entirely cured and Miss Richards is being taken to Colorado to spend the summer with a married sister. Commissioner Richards, after seeing his daughters safely established will proceed to Minnesota to supervise the opening of Indian lands on the Red Lake Indian reservation. Upon the completion of this work, for which he has been specially detailed, he will go to Chamberlain, S. D., to personally conduct the opening sale of the lands of the Rosebud Indian country and from there will proceed to Devil's Lake, N. D., to supervise the sale of the lands of the Indians in that section of the country.

Auditorium telephone, office, No. 1276; building, No. 1338. OPENING DEVIL'S LAKE RESERVE President Signs Proclamation Fixing

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The president today signed a proclamation providing for the opening of the ceded lands of the Devil's Lake Indian reservation in North Dakota. The land is to be disposed of by a registration and drawing similar to that provided for the opening of the ceded lands of the Rosebud reservation in South Dakota by recent proclamation.

The Devil's Lake Indian reservation contains about 85,000 acres of land, of which approximately 500 homestead entries may be made. The registration will be made at Devil's Lake and Grand Forks, N. D., and will begin August 8 and run until August 20. The drawing will be held at Devil's Lake and will begin at 8 o'clock on September 8 and will proceed for sixty days. Any land subsequently remaining unentered will be subject to homestead entry on payment of \$4.50 per acre. Only qualified homesteaders will be allowed to participate in the drawing and all persons must register for themselves, except honorably discharged soldiers and sailors, who will be entitled to make homestead entries through agents.

The proclamation reserves 1,553 acres for the Fort Totten school and also makes reservations for the Protestant Episcopal church, the Raven Hill Presbyterian church, the Wood Lake Presbyterian church, the mission of the Sisters of Charity, the St.
