INCREASES IN THE VALUATIONS Gain of Sixty-Four Per Cent.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, July 8 .- (Special.)-If the reports to the State Board of Equalization from ten counties in the state of the assessed valuation of the property in each is an indication of what the other countles intend to return, the assessed valuation of Nebraska property this year will be in the neighborhood of 64 per cent higher than it was last year. These ten countles Fillmore, Sherman, Dundy, Thurston, Dakota, Red Willow, Gosper, Rock, Hall and Sarby, returned a total assessed valuation of \$21.555,816.90. Last year these same counties returned a total of \$18,106,547.74, an increase of \$8,447,271.16, or something over 64 per cent increase of last year's assessment These counties include in their returns


