

SOOS TAKE DOUBLE-HEADER

Tallenders Soop Pa's Boys Twice on the Fourth. Blunders lose both of the games. Pfeister fans twelve errors in the first game and Quick, New Slab-

Denver's hand of Sioux celebrated Fourth of July at Vinton Street park yesterday morning and afternoon and came out of the fireworks and powder smoke with two of Pa's best scalps in their belts. Omaha lost a double-header and saw the Big Chief of the ball-owning team make ready to victorize in their home and make ready to embark with more if it is possible. But Pa says it isn't possible, so there you are.

Omaha lost both games through blundering. Duster Miller gave the last one away the twelfth inning as though it had been an expired street car transfer. Omaha's five errors in the first game, which, barring the mistakes, was a good one, give an idea as to how it was cashed in. The crowds at both games were large and enthusiastic. When Howard made his home run in the afternoon the air was heavy laden with powder smoke and the roar of artillery sounded like the bombardment of Fort Arica. As the firing died down, the cheers of the 6,500 fans who didn't bring their canons along sounded as if they were the Japs entering that besieged city.

Sioux City established a record for itself by making its first winning in an extra inning game. If Omaha established any records nobody knew anything about it or would care to know.

Pfeister's Battle Goes to Kotal. The loss of the morning game is to be bemoaned and not without reason. It was a battle between pitchers, in which Kotal won out by holding Omaha down to three hits, but most of all by supporting his own team by not wanting at critical times. On the other hand, when Pfeister needed aid most, there was no help at hand. That was in the ninth inning, when the Sioux copped out a victory which they had no earthly right to do. While the victors called their hits from Pfeister's firing line with the exception of the ninth, there were no two in an inning. Not only that, but Pfeister struck out the western leaguers for four of the last three innings, made by Denver, and as good as the 1903 record of any league for that matter. Each team came in for a run in the first inning. After that there was great base ball, steady and clean. The sixth brought another run for Pa's proteges. In the eighth Pfeister reached the first strike on Dolan's error and scored on Marryott's hit. Two hits for the Sioux and two errors for Omaha decided things in the ninth. Pfeister allowed a pair of singles at the windup and made an error himself. Not one of the runs made was earned.
